Open Meeting

to discuss the formation of a

Local Action Team

at the

Haven School, Atlantic Drive

Thursday 28th February

Starting at 7:30pm

In the September 2007 issue of Waterlines, we reported that the SHRA committee, having consulted our community Police officers and Ward Councillors, had concluded that a harbour wide Local Action Team (LAT) would be too large to control and that we would therefore be looking to support individual developments interested in setting up their own LAT. At that meeting, Councillor Susan Morris agreed to set up an open meeting at the Haven School so that the issues could be discussed, and the requirement evaluated.

We were, therefore, very disturbed to see a Sovereign Liberal Democrats newsletter advertising a meeting at Di Lieto's Coffee Lounge on the Waterfront. We were also very disappointed that at no time had the SHRA been consulted, nor had an invitation been issued to the SHRA to take part in the meeting.

Distribution of the Focus newsletter was very patchy and many residents did not receive it. In the event, attendance at the meeting was very poor, and a number of those who did manage to

get there were very surprised that there was no representative from the SHRA. Not surprisingly, being totally unrepresentative, the meeting was unable to reach any meaningful conclusion, except that a further meeting was necessary, and that the SHRA should be fully represented. At the time of going to print, Councillor Morris has failed to issue minutes of the meeting.

Having discussed the situation with our community Police officers, it was decided that we would revert to the original plan and the SHRA would take on the responsibility of organising the meeting. This will now be held at the Haven School (see above).

The meeting is, of course, open to all, but it is particularly important that those of you who would be interested in setting up a LAT should come along.

Our Community Police officers, our Ward Councillors and our County Councillor have all been invited to attend. I'm sure that they are all looking forward to the opportunity to meet harbour residents and discuss local issues. *(over)*

(LAT continued)

Although we are supporting this meeting, we are still not convinced that the harbour needs LATs. Despite the scare mongering headlines in the recent Liberal Democrat 'Focus' newsletter,

the harbour has the lowest crime levels in the town. As the Eastbourne Police District Commander said: "If the rest of the town was as crime free as the harbour, I'd be laying off some of my officers."

More flats for the harbour

The appeal by Jones Homes for the variation of a reserved matters application, seeking planning approval for an additional twelve two bedroom apartments on a site of 0.25 hectares, which would bring the total number of dwelling on the site to 24, a density of 96 dwellings per hectare was allowed by the Planning Inspector.

The Planning Committee had accepted the argument of local people that it was an overdevelopment of the site and would be detrimental to the sustainability of the local community, and unanimously refused the application.

The Planning Officers opted to have the appeal decided by written representation. Residents felt it was imperative that they should have the opportunity to present their case to the Inspector in person and urged the officers to opt for a public hearing, which would allow the SHRA to be considered as a party in the appeal, with right of representation. Despite 130 letters of objection, many of them requesting a public hearing, including one from Nigel Waterson MP the officers refused the request. The applicant's representation to the Planning Inspectorate included a number of very questionable statements that should have been challenged, but were not.

Contrast this with an application for seven apartments on a site of 0.1098 hectares, a density of 64 dwellings per hectare in Meads. This application was considered to be a gross overdevelopment of the site and was recommended for refusal by the Planning Officers, a decision upheld by the Planning Committee. The applicant has appealed and the officers have opted for the appeal to be decided at a public hearing.

One of the main differences in the two appeals is that the Meads residents are being fully supported by their Ward Councillors. Although two of our Ward Councillors are members of the Planning Committee, and are therefore not allowed to make representations, they are in a strong position to influence the officers. However, there is no evidence that they made any attempt to do so. Councillor Susan Morris did make a representation, but failed to ask the Planning Inspector to hold a Public Hearing.

One aspect of the appeal that is alarming is that in its representation to the Planning Inspector, Jones Homes stated that the motion passed by the Borough Council that there should be no further residential development at the harbour only applied to the remaining development land. The Leader of the Council, David Tutt, and the former Leader of the Council, Ian Lucas, have both confirmed privately, and in public, that this motion refers to all harbour development and that by accepting the motion, it became council policy. That statement was not challenged by the planning officers in their representation.

Despite this support from elected members, the planning officers had recommended approval of the application, and also a previous similar application that was also refused by the Planning Committee. By recommending approval, the officers were unable to defend the appeal. However, had they opted for a Public Hearing, the SHRA could have taken up the fight on their behalf.

Sadly, the motivation for this failure to support harbour residents is almost certainly financial.

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Parish Council on hold - but not for long

We have been getting a lot of enquiries about progress on the formation of a Parish Council for Sovereign Harbour, so we thought we should give you an update.

Because of recent changes to the enabling legislation, it was decided to hold back until we had a chance to see what changes had been made, and whether the wording on the petition that so many of you have already signed was still valid.

The good news is that we won't need to get you to sign again, the bad news is that because of the changes, the Department for Communities has been sitting on the applications that were pending, causing a backlog.

The other bad news is that the evaluation of the application has been devolved to the local authority, in our case Eastbourne Borough Council, and indications are that the current EBC administration is hostile to what we are trying to achieve.

Many of you will have seen the very disingenuous article by Ward Councillor, Susan Morris, in a recent issue of the LIBDem 'Focus' newsletter entitled 'No Town Hall in the Harbour', in which she focuses only on the possible additional costs, but ignores the likely benefits. Councillor Morris says that local people don't want an extra layer of local government; this is entirely contrary to what we have found, and we certainly spend more time talking to harbour residents than our Ward Councillors.

Councillor Morris says: "Since being elected back in May, your LibDem

councillors have been determined to provide a strong voice for all harbour residents, regardless of politics. We know that our area needs vigorous representation and we're committed to providing it." Well, they've had nearly ten months, and we haven't seen it yet, perhaps they're just slow starters! A good first step would be to publish their home telephone numbers so that their electors can contact them, as their predecessors did.

Fortunately, the harbour has had the SHRA to fill the vacuum. We see a Parish Council as the logical, democratic, successor to the work of the SHRA.

We believe we have the support of harbour residents and so, with or without the support of our Ward Councillors, we will press ahead with the campaign.

What is very confusing is that the Liberal Democrats nationally are committed to the devolution of power to the lowest level, which is Parish Councils. When we asked the LibDem Parliamentary candidate, Stephen Lloyd to explain this discrepancy, he said that he saw no conflict with national policy. Perhaps he should check with his leader.

By contrast, in a recent meeting with members of the SHRA committee, our MP, Nigel Waterson, said that he was very much in favour of Parish Councils and the contributions that they were able to make to the welfare of their local communities. He added that, provided the majority of harbour residents were in favour, he felt that Sovereign Harbour would benefit from a Parish Council.

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Do you remember when cinemas were small and comfortable? If so, you will love the Pavilion Cinema, which is tucked away in George Street Hailsham.

Hailsham Pavilion Cinema was erected as a purpose built 'picture palace' in 1921 and was officially opened on Monday 28th November 1921. The opening performance was "The Kid" starring Charlie Chaplin, and the first house was crowded.

At the height of its popularity, the Cinema opened every day, with a change of programme on Mondays and Thursdays. A separate film was shown on Sundays.

However, in 1965, it closed and stood empty until an application for change of use to a Bingo Club was approved in 1967.

Officially listed as a Grade II building of historic and architectural interest, and in the Conservation Area of Hailsham, it has been described as having 'a classical facade', and is possibly one of the most elaborate small provincial cinemas ever built.

The building ceased to be used for Bingo in 1985, remaining empty until 1987 and, by 1991, having been totally neglected for four years, much work was needed, mainly to prevent the ingress of rain through the roof which had caused severe damage to the interior.

Despite damage to much of the fittings caused by dampness, and the actions of vandals, the general structure of the building appeared to be sound and in some strange way retained an atmosphere reminiscent of the old

Victorian theatres and picture palaces.

In 1993, the refurbishment and restoration became the dream of former Hailsham Town Mayor, June Bourne. She was getting to the end of her term of office and had £1400 left in her expenses which she wanted to use for the community's benefit. After consulting with the other Councillors, it was decided to open a building society account to start raising funds for the restoration of the Pavilion. A Supporters' association was formed, Hailsham Old Pavilion Society (HOPS), with members paying £5 a year subscription.

By the end of 1999, HOPS had over 800 members and had raised almost £100,000 from the local community. This, with other donations and a grant of £275,500 from the Heritage Lottery Fund, help towards the £0.5 million cost of the restoration.

The Pavilion re-opened in February 2000 with 203 seats (plus facilities for wheelchairs) and is able to offer a uniquely friendly atmosphere with many people working as volunteers.

We are very pleased to tell you that members of the SHRA, on production of a current SHRA membership card, have been offered a 10% reduction on cinema entry prices for all performances, with the exception of Hailsham Film Club events. This discount applies to all members of your party.

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Can we trust the Trust?

Another year passes and once again bills from the Sovereign Harbour Trust fall on our doormats.

Once again, despite assurances from the developers' sales staff that bills would reduce year-on-year as more properties became occupied, the amount of the demand continues to rise.

Once again, the number of properties used to calculate the individual cost seems to bear little relationship to the number of occupied properties. This year, it is said to be 2,892, which seems very much at odds with the number of properties to which we deliver Waterlines, close to 3,500.

Although the Trust's numbers seem to be consistently at variance with ours, we have no way of verifying their accuracy because the trustees refuse to specify the addresses of the properties that are being charged.

When the Environment Agency finally appointed their trustees in 2006, we had hopes that the trust would become more transparent; indeed the new trustees assured us that they would ensure that would be the case. Unfortunately, this has not happened, the finances of the trust remain a mystery, as do the origins of the trust.

Amazingly, nobody seems to know why the trust was allowed into existence. Questions under the Freedom of Information Act to the Environment Agency have failed to produce convincing answers, and the Borough Council denies any involvement, at any time, at any level, which we find very difficult to understand. How on earth could EBC stand idly by watching a serious injustice being perpetrated on its residents?

Eastbourne has 12.9km of coastline, 11km is maintained by Eastbourne Borough Council with funding (over)

(Continued) from central government; 1.9km is maintained by the Environment Agency, funded by the Sovereign Trust through charges levied on the residents of Sovereign Harbour. But the Borough Council has no idea how this happened, or had any involvement in the process. Unjust though this is, it palls into insignificance when compared to the Marina Rent that is collected by the Sovereign Harbour Trust on behalf of the marina operators, Premier Marinas. It will possibly surprise many of you to know that, when selling the marina operation to Premier Marinas, Sovereign Harbour Ltd. factored in the income from the Marina Rent. Not only are harbour residents funding the cost of sea defences that should have been provided by Carillion, but we are also subsidising the operation of the marina and harbour, which we are prohibited from using.

In their accounts, the Trust lumps together the cost of sea defences and harbour maintenance, but only the sea defences element goes to the Environment Agency, the remainder goes straight into Premier's coffers, and into the pockets of their shareholders. From information supplied by the Environment Agency, the harbour maintenance element is thought to be about 75% of the total.

When challenged over the justice of these charges, a spokesman for Premier Marina told us that the charge was justified because the marina environment raised the value of our property. He seems somewhat surprised to be told that, contrary to national and local trends, harbour property prices were falling.

So, can we trust the Trust? Until it publishes detailed breakdowns of income and expenditure, the answer has to be no. We will continue to press for an increase in transparency and resident trustees. It is significant that one of the Environment Agency trustees is a Parish Councillor from Pevensey Bay, perhaps if and when we get a Parish Council for Sovereign Harbour they will have less opportunity to resist our demands.

Eastbourne Seniors' Forum

In spite of really bad weather on 4th January, there was a large turnout of interested local residents at the Underground Theatre for the first public meeting of the newly formed Eastbourne Seniors' Forum..

The meeting was the first opportunity for residents to hear about the vision and purpose of the Forum which is now part of a network of senior forums set up across the country, specifically to enable over 50s to have a collective voice over issues and decision which impact their every day lives.

Eastbourne had, up until then, been one of the few major towns in East Sussex without a Forum, but from the response at the meeting from many people offering practical support and help, a Chairman was appointed and a Steering Committee is being set up.

Terri Ferrari the co-ordinator introduced various speakers who explained the concept and working of Seniors Forums from different national and local perspectives.

The speakers included Nigel Waterson MP, Vicky Smith East Sussex County Councils Older Peoples Involvement Manager, Richard Drinkall CEO Age Concern Eastbourne and John Appleyard Chairman of Hastings and Bexhill Seniors Forum.

The meeting was well supported by representatives and counsellors from the borough and the county as well as voluntary organisations and others with interests in seniors and their significance in the community.

Harbour resident Steve Thornett was elected as Chairman of the Steering Committee, and harbour residents Carole Penney and Jan Weeks were amongst the group of Eastbourne seniors who will form the committee. Steve explained details of how the Forum will operate, and chaired a lively question and answer session which followed.

Steve said: "This was a really good first

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meeting, over 60 people came, all with different ideas for how we could make the forum really relevant. It was a very good natured debate - and I look forwards to watching the Forum develop."

The Seniors Forum membership is entirely free and open to all Eastbourne residents aged over 50 years, regardless of background, race or belief, of age.
