

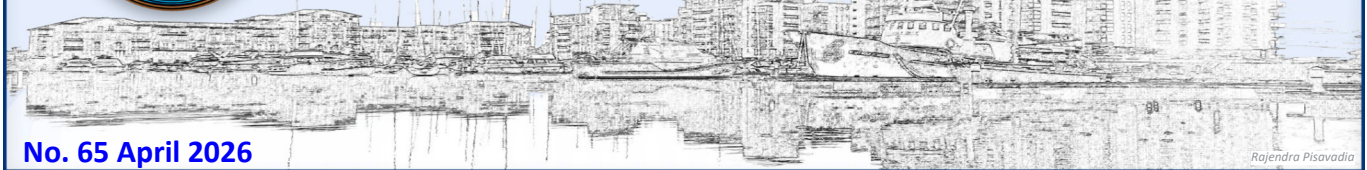

The Annual Rentcharge

The SHRA has received responses from both Premier and the Sovereign Harbour Trust addressing some of the points raised in our letters of December 22nd 2025. We have arranged a meeting with Premier for next week in order to discuss our concerns further.

The Sovereign Harbour Trust and the Sovereign Harbour (Sea Defences) Community Interest Company (CIC) now has a vacancy for a homeowner director and we have asked if they will accept a nomination from SHRA. (The CIC is owned by the SHT and the board members are the same for both organisations).

Three SHRA committee members accepted an invitation from Josh Babarinde MP to visit Parliament to watch him question the DEFRA minister about the Rentcharge (see report and transcript below). We're hopeful that a meeting may be arranged in order for this to be discussed at ministerial level.

Harbourside House

We continue to engage with the site managers for the Maris View care home and the McCarthy Stone development. We've recently requested that their contractors park more carefully between the surgery roundabout and the Yacht Club as we've had a number of complaints regarding dangerous parking. We have a meeting arranged with the Maris View management prior to their opening.

Fishermans Quay

We continue to monitor the tidiness of the Fishermans Quay area with a marked improvement.

McCauley Place Open Space

We've been in correspondence with Stratton, the developers of McCauley Place and we've been informed that responsibility for the open space has been accepted by EBC.

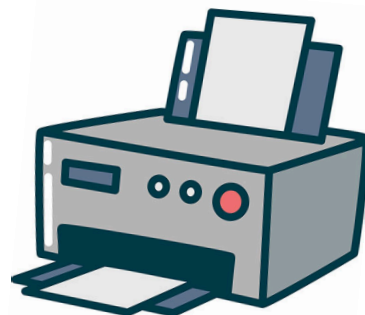
EBC Consultation on Draft Eastbourne Local Plan

SHRA Takes the Fight for Fairer Sea Defences to Parliament

On a beautiful, sun-drenched Thursday, March 19, representatives from the Sovereign Harbour Residents Association (SHRA) headed to the heart of Westminster to witness a pivotal moment in our ongoing campaign for fairness.

Keith, Mandy, and I caught the early 6:28 AM train from Eastbourne, arriving in a London filled with blooming spring trees and a sense of purpose. We were there as invited guests of our MP, Josh Babarinde OBE, to hear him speak up for Sovereign Harbour residents on the floor of the House of Commons.

Standing Up for the Sovereign Harbour Residents

At 9:30 AM, Josh took our case directly to the Minister. He highlighted the unique and unfair burden placed on our community, noting that Sovereign Harbour is the only marina of its kind in the UK where residents—rather than the Government—are expected to pay for their own sea defences.

With this year's charges seeing a staggering 16% increase, Josh pressed the Minister for a formal review. We are thrilled to report that his persistence is paying off: he is now working to secure a face-to-face meeting between the Minister and SHRA representatives within the next couple of months.

A Day of Teamwork and Tradition

The highlight of the trip was hearing Josh mention SHRA's presence in the gallery during the debate, ensuring our voices were literally in the room where decisions are made. Following the session, Josh kindly hosted us for a guided tour of Parliament, where we had an insightful and productive discussion about the next steps for our community. It is truly heartening to have an MP who is so dedicated to our cause.

To cap off the day, we enjoyed a sunny walk along the Thames (right) and a quick lunch before catching the 14:24 PM train back from Victoria.

After 20,700 steps and hours of productive advocacy, we returned to Eastbourne feeling tired but inspired. This wasn't just a political mission; it was a wonderful team-building day that has brought us one step closer to securing a fairer arrangement for all Sovereign Harbour residents.

We are committed to supporting coastal communities, and that is why, between April 2024 and March 2026, over £600 million has been invested in protection from sea flooding, tidal flooding and coastal erosion.

Sovereign Harbour in Eastbourne is the only marina of its kind in Europe; thousands of residents, rather than the Government, have to cover the cost of sea defences through an annual charge. The charge this year increased by 16%—way more than inflation—and there is poor transparency as to why. Will the Minister meet me and representatives of the amazing Sovereign Harbour Residents Association, who are in the Gallery, to hear more about the issues with the harbour charge, and to help us secure a fairer arrangement?

The annual sea defence charge is a legal obligation that was placed on property owners in Sovereign Harbour in 1988, so it was introduced under Thatcher and was unchanged under the coalition. It contributes to the maintenance of the harbour and the sea defences on the south coast between Pevensey Bay and Eastbourne. We spent nearly £5 million this year, and plan to invest over £100 million over the next decade. Of that £5 million, £400,000 comes from the rent charge in 2026-27. We have also secured record funding of £1.4 billion for over 600 flood schemes across all regions in England.



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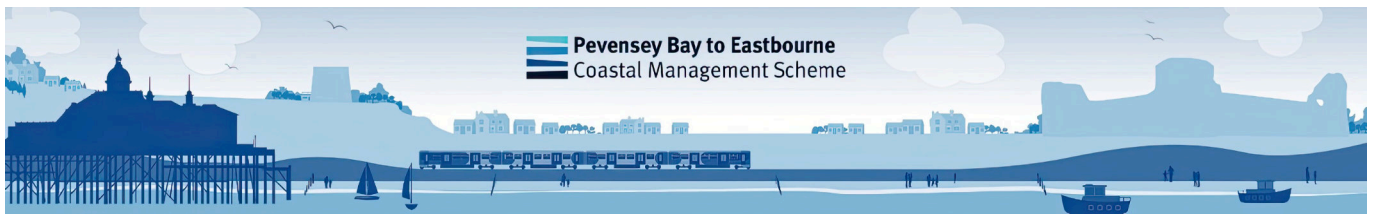
SHRA offers a limited number of six annual banner sponsorships. Sponsorship helps us meet the cost of our website, Waterlines and our work.

Pevensey Bay to Eastbourne Coastal Management Scheme. What's been happening and what's next

Short-term (2025-2027):

After a stormy start to the year, with two named storms, Goretta and Chandra, work on the beach has continued. Our dozers have been profiling the beach and rebuilding the crest, while the recycling team moves shingle from the eastern frontage back towards the harbour. This helps counteract longshore drift and keeps the maintained frontage in good condition.

The second shingle bypass of the season will be completed by the end of March. This work involves transporting material from Whitepoint to the Northeast Beach by lorry. When shingle builds up at the Eastbourne rock spur, it provides a useful source of material that we can add back into the sediment system. These bypass works usually take between 5 and 10 days.



Unfortunately, owing to severe weather conditions off the Irish Coast during February, the *Sospan Dau* has been delayed, and the planned recharge will now take place later this year.

As we approach the end of the recycling campaign, you will see other activities on the beach over the coming months. These include public safety works, such as removing loose timber and bolts from groynes and other structures along the frontage. We will also be installing new signage throughout the year. Regular beach surveys continue year-round to help us monitor conditions and maintain the beach as needed.

We would also like to share a staffing update. Paul Levitt has moved into a new role managing Operations for East and West Sussex. While Pevensey Bay remains part of Paul's wider area, Amber Carr will continue as your main Beach Manager contact. You can reach Amber at: pevenseybeachmanager@environment-agency.gov.uk

Medium-term (2027 – 2037):

We are preparing to begin the final phase of our exploratory beach investigations this spring. Specialist teams will be on the beach over the coming weeks using drilling equipment to help us understand what lies beneath the surface.

These investigations will focus on areas around several of the existing timber groynes. Developing a detailed picture of the ground conditions, and the condition of the buried sections of the timber structures, will be essential in informing the design work for future improvements.

While the work is taking place, you may notice short periods of noise and very limited closures of small beach sections. We will keep any disruption to a minimum.

Thank you to all residents for your patience and understanding as we carry out these important works, which are scheduled to be completed before July.

In other important news, the new beach design is now entering its final stages. Look out for more information about what this means for your area later this year!

Long-term (future phases from 2037):

More than 1,000 people took part in our **community survey**, offering a rich picture of what the Pevensey Bay to Eastbourne coastline means to those who use and love it. Responses were predominantly from older residents, with people under 30 under-represented, and we're now actively working with the Coastal Schools Partnership and other educational institutions to help address this imbalance in future engagement.

The survey showed deep appreciation for the coast's beauty, wildlife, heritage, and everyday value, as well as strong concerns about climate change, erosion, flooding and water quality. These insights will play an important role in shaping the next phases of the Coastal Management Scheme.

Orienteering Event - Sat, 9th May



Southdowns Orienteers a “not for profit” club run by volunteers are organising an urban orienteering event around Sovereign Harbour public footways on **Saturday 9th May 2026**. Eastbourne Borough Council and Premier Marinas have given permission for the event to take place.

The event is planned to take place **between 6pm - 8.30pm**, with up to 150 competitors taking part. Event parking and registration will be located in the Marina.

Approximately 30 temporary orienteering control markers (see image) will be placed around the harbour. These markers will be used to create 6 different courses on which competitors, starting at one-minute intervals, visit a number of the markers, in a set order, against the clock.



Being an orienteering competition the routes can't be shown in advance, but if you spot a marker in your area please come out and cheer on the competitors giving them a friendly Sovereign Harbour welcome experience.

Or better still.... **Give it go!**

Southdowns Orienteers are offering Harbour residents the chance to have a go at orienteering for free on a “Come and try it” Sovereign Harbour course where the aim would be to visit as many of the temporary orienteering control markers you can in 30 minutes or under.

Residents can take part in their everyday clothes if they are walking or may wish to wear a T-shirt (bright colour), shorts and trainers if they intend to run around. The aim is for it to be fun and provide an introduction to the sport. Children under the age of 16 need to be accompanied by an adult.

To take part in this new experience, please attend the event registration, under the glass canopy by the 4 Seasons Brasserie, **between 6:15pm – 6:45pm** where you will be given a brief explanation of the rules, a map and a timing chip. Southdowns Orienteers look forward to welcoming you.

Membership of the SHRA is open to all households in owned or rented residential property located within the Sovereign Harbour estate, and owners of such residential property. The annual membership fee is £5 per person.

Creamy Amarillo Chicken Thighs

This dish is believed to have originated in the 16th century, likely originating from Manjar Blanc, a sweet Spanish dish that was adapted into a savoury dish upon arrival in Peru. It is a staple of Peruvian cuisine today.

Ingredients

- 4–8 Skin-on chicken thighs
- 2 tbsp Olive oil
- 1 medium yellow or red onion, chopped
- 3-4 Cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tbsp Aji Amarillo paste
- 1 tsp Ground cumin
- 1/2 cup Chicken stock
- Half cup of coconut cream or alternatively, use double cream
- 1 tsp Sugar (optional, to balance heat)
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Fresh lemon (for garnish)

Directions

Rub chicken thighs with salt and pepper, then coat thoroughly with a good portion of the aji amarillo paste. Let it marinate for at least 1 hour in the fridge.

Heat olive oil in a large frying pan over medium-high heat. Pan-fry the chicken thighs for 4–5 minutes per side until the skin is golden brown and cooked through. Remove from the pan and set aside.

Sauté Aromatics: In the same pan with the chicken fat, add a little extra oil if needed. Sauté the onion until translucent, then add garlic and cumin, cooking until fragrant, about 1 minute.

Make Sauce: Stir in the remaining aji amarillo paste and cook for 2 minutes, add the chicken stock, using a spoon to scrape up all the browned bits from the pan. Bring to a gentle simmer.

Add Cream: Pour in the coconut cream and stir until the sauce is smooth and slightly thickened. Alternatively, you can use double cream.

Simmer: Return the chicken to the pan, spooning the sauce over the top, and simmer for 5 minutes until the chicken is heated through and the flavours have blended.

Adjust Taste: if the sauce is too spicy add a teaspoon of sugar, garnish with onion rings, tomatoes and a slice of lemon and serve with rice.





Dog Control and Behaviour



Dog Behaviour

Following on from my previous article about **dog control** for which I thank you and appreciate the positive feedback I received

Dog behaviour is a really interesting and complex subject; it is also extremely rewarding for both the owner and the dog once it has been properly understood and practised. I teach positive reinforcement dog training, also known as Operant learning which rewards our four-legged friends for correct behaviour and appropriately chastises them for unacceptable behaviour. Simple, you would think!

Unfortunately, many dog owners do not quite understand this process. For example, a dog will quite often jump up to meet and greet you, first thing in the morning or when you have just arrived back home. This is when your dog will generally and most likely jump up against your leg and get a cuddle, a playful stroke, have their ears played with etc, great fun! But not if you want your dog to stop jumping up. You are positively rewarding your dog for this behaviour, so of course they will keep coming back for more. Some owners push the dog away to try and correct this behaviour, even more fun! Either way, your dog will be receiving friendly hand contact and verbal interaction, as an excited dog, what is not to like about that, and guaranteed to bring them back for more time after time.



If you're happy to accept this behaviour for you and your family, that's fine; however, visitors to your home, and perhaps people you meet while out and about, may regard this as undesirable behaviour and let's be honest, not everyone welcomes such attention, and for some in particular it can cause a great deal of anxiety and upset.

Some friendly free advice to address this issue: next time your furry friend jumps up at your leg, simply turn away and ignore this behaviour. You are then giving them negative feedback [a form of chastisement]. Your dog will eventually get the idea and naturally drop off your leg: time and patience are required, after all you are training your dog new skills. Immediately they drop off and have four feet on the ground, sitting or standing, praise them [positive feedback], quality treats often help at this point. You are now rewarding good and acceptable behaviour. Continue with this each time your dog jumps up, then drops off, they will quickly catch on.

Behaviour is very important, whether you choose to purchase a puppy or rehome a dog, things have to be carefully considered and depends greatly on your personal circumstances. Whichever path you choose will probably result in having a degree of ups and downs.

Taking on a dog that requires rehoming can be extremely rewarding. I would always recommend using an established and trusted rescue centre, who will check you and your domestic circumstances, for compatibility before allowing a resettlement trial period. The behaviour of any rescued dog can never be totally guaranteed as we simply do not always know its previous history. Also, please beware of any dog advertised for rehoming on social media, etc. There might be underlying reasons.

Very good friends of mine rehomed a young German Shepherd cross from a registered rescue kennels. It was understood that this dog had been abandoned and consequently left to fend for herself in the countryside with no food, water, or shelter. Nevertheless, they made the decision to go ahead and give her a chance. Initially and quite understandably the behaviour of “Tess” was very erratic to say the least, digging for worms to eat etc, the poor dog had never known what a caring, safe home environment was. It took “Tess” quite a while to adapt to her new surroundings which she has now successfully done. My friends have invested a great deal of time and effort in improving her life and behaviour. I am pleased to say that “Tess” is now really quite chilled out and a credit to my friends who have put in a huge amount of work to achieve this.



If you choose to go down the puppy route, hopefully you will have done your homework or sought professional advice before bringing your new family member home. It is quite a misconception to think that raising a cute little puppy is easy. What could possibly go wrong, you say. In reality it is really easy to get training wrong because your puppy is learning from its new family and surroundings all the time, and developing its behaviour based on what gains them the most reward. For example, simply chasing your puppy around the house to recover one of your slippers, is definitely not a good idea; what youngster does not love a game of chase. This behaviour will almost certainly lead to several other, possibly more serious, undesirable behaviours.

Unless you really know how to raise and train a puppy properly, I would always recommend seeking professional guidance in the early and formative weeks of your pup’s life. Do not forget your puppy is not deliberately being naughty, they are simply performing the behaviour that prompts the most reaction from you, such fun teaching humans how to play like a puppy. Remember, prevention is always better than cure.

Behavioural problems manifest themselves in a variety of ways. Recently my wife and I were sitting in the very welcome sunshine at one of the lovely harbour restaurants enjoying the peace and quiet with a nice cup of coffee. On the opposite side of the harbour, I could see a lady with her two dogs one of which was walking beautifully by her side, the other was pulling on the lead and continually barked for no visible apparent reason. I was ever so pleased when this lady and her two dogs settled at a table quite near to us. One dog quietly laid by her feet, not making a sound, displaying wonderful behaviour, the other, angelic looking, middle-aged little rascal never settled at all but continued to bark and be disruptive. Foolishly and perhaps naively, I thought the lady would correct her dog’s annoying and unacceptable behaviour; instead she constantly apologised and made many varied excuses to everyone nearby for the disruption her dog was causing.

It was time for us to leave, along with several other tables of customers who appeared to have the same idea, so much for relaxing in the sun with a cappuccino.

I am sure you will agree that, in general, most dog owners are respectful and responsible toward other people and the environment. Now that spring is here, more of us will be out and about with our furry friends enjoying the Harbour, beaches, and open spaces of Eastbourne.....

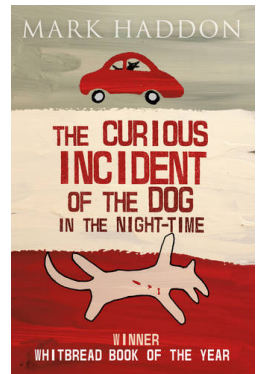
Sovereign Harbour Book and Creative Writing Group



The group continues with our regular morning meetings (third Friday of every month) in the Yacht Club. Good-natured lively literary discussion guaranteed.

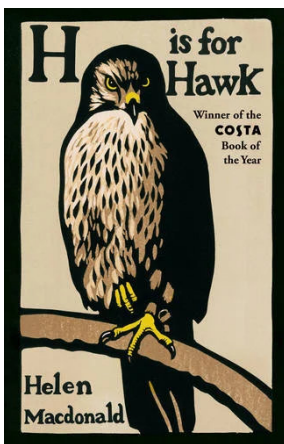

Report of March WI Meeting.

She then introduced the speaker Neil Peters from Eastbourne Council. Neil is the Community Recycling Engagement Officer. He came to explain how Eastbourne's waste is managed and what happens to it. It was interesting to hear that they are not only responsible for our household waste but deal with street cleaning, beach spillages and even dead mammals that are washed up on our shores.

Nothing that they collect goes to landfill. What isn't recycled goes to Newhaven Energy Recovery Facility (pictured), an incinerator that treats the waste to generate electricity. The electricity is then sold to the National Grid and is enough to supply 25,000 homes. The steam from the process is turned back to water, the ashes are sifted for hardcore, magnets are used to sift the metal (which goes to Belgium) and the rest of the ashes are used on roads. So nothing is wasted!



Neil went on to tell the members how to use the new food waste containers that are going to be rolled out from April. He had leaflets and slides and answered lots of questions from the members.



Before tea Diane told the members that the July meeting was going to have a 'Strawberry' theme and asked them to wear red. She also suggested that they could wear yellow to the April meeting? – if they wanted to! There was a list for observers for the April committee meeting; an invitation from Westham Evening WI to their Birthday Party; a box for contributions for ACWW.

A Bit of History - November 1992

26 Eastbourne Herald, Saturday, November 28, 1992

GATES for the massive twin locks at Sovereign Harbour were lowered into place on Monday marking the beginning of the end of major construction work. In all, eight curved gates or leaves will be secured – four on the seaward side and four inner gates for the land side.

Eastbourne's Mayor, Maurice Skilton, helped manoeuvre the 350-tonnes mobile crane which lowered the first gate into place.

Each outer gate is 11.5 metres high and weighs 25 tonnes. The gates were made in Newcastle by Pearson Reelotech, fabricators for the sub contractors GEC Alsthom mechanical engineers.

Tom Tagg, project manager of Kier Construction, main contractors for the Tarmac project, said the whole operation

went better than planned.

The parts were assembled in the locks themselves. Each section was bolted together, then lifted into position and bolted to the arms on the lock itself. It is quite an intricate procedure lowering them in.

The gates are revolutionary in terms of size and the largest purpose built marina locks in the UK. They are curved – a quarter of a circle – operated from the lock keeper's building by hydraulic cylinders pushing them out from their recesses from within the lock's structure to the closed position.

Deliveries will continue throughout the month. We will be installing the next pair during December with the inner gates following shortly behind.

Subject to final National Rivers Authority approval we should be starting to dig out the harbour entrance in February, ready for the opening on May 2.

Kiers had expected the operation to take a whole day for

each gate but managed to get two completed on Monday.

There will always be 2.4 metres of water in the bottom of the locks allowing sailors 24-hour access to the inner harbour.

When closed the lock gates can be walked across.

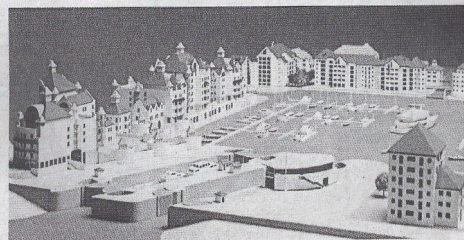

The Maritime Volunteer Service



The Maritime Volunteer Service in East Sussex has had the sort of month that neatly dismantles the lazy assumption that volunteer units go quiet outside the summer season. If anything, the past few weeks have been a concentrated display of what steady, disciplined effort looks like when no one is watching.

Take a typical Tuesday evening at Sovereign Harbour. While most people are winding down, the Unit is just getting started. One recent session opened with a first aid lecture delivered by an in-house instructor whose background includes training Police Firearms Medics. This was not a token refresher. It was operationally grounded, experience-led teaching, the kind that quietly raises standards across the board.

That was followed by navigation training, which, despite the jokes about GPS failures, remains a core seamanship skill that separates competent crews from passengers. Alongside this, the Unit's Yachtmaster Theory students continue to put in the hard miles intellectually, guided by Les Quilty and supported by Unit 2IC Robin Russell, whose "glamorous assistant" billing is still under investigation.

Midweek activity has been just as purposeful. A visit to the marina control tower offered members a behind-the-scenes look at lock operations. It is the sort of detail that most harbour users never think about, but for a unit that prides itself on professional standards, understanding how the harbour actually functions is not optional. It is essential.

Away from the classroom and harbour tours, there has been steady progress on the fleet. My Lad B has emerged from a full refurbishment looking sharp and will be back in the water shortly. The Unit's RIB continues to support RYA Powerboat training, while Petral, the large wooden rowing boat, remains a versatile workhorse around the harbour.



Which brings us to the obvious question many locals have been asking. Where is East Sussex 1?

The Unit's principal training vessel, East Sussex 1 (ES1), has been absent from her usual berth in Eastbourne for a simple reason: essential maintenance. Over the past weeks, ES1 has been in Gosport and Portsmouth undergoing repairs to ensure she is fully fit for the demands of the coming season. This is not cosmetic work. It is the kind of upkeep that determines whether a vessel is merely serviceable or genuinely reliable when it matters.

Her recent passage from Gosport to Portchester, repositioning to Trafalgar Wharf, was completed cleanly and without incident.

It is worth noting that this sort of routine movement is anything but casual. It reflects a level of training and discipline that allows a volunteer crew to operate to professional standards.

Once the work is complete, ES1 will return to Sovereign Harbour and resume a full programme of activity. That includes community support, event cover, and practical training for both members and partner organisations. In short, she will go back to doing exactly what she is designed for.



Beyond vessels and training schedules, there is also the less visible work of outreach. Elaine Bowdery continues to represent the Unit at community groups, recently speaking to the WI in Catsfield. It is easy to overlook this side of things, but without it, organisations like this slowly become invisible.

The reality is straightforward. The Maritime Volunteer Service in East Sussex is not a summer hobby. It operates year round, building capability in small, consistent steps. Members train through the winter, study for qualifications like Yachtmaster Theory, and prepare to take on real responsibility as future skippers.

So if East Sussex 1 has been missing from her berth, it is not a sign of inactivity. It is the opposite. It is a sign that the Unit is doing the unglamorous, necessary work that ensures when the season starts, everything and everyone is ready.

For those looking in from the outside, wondering what this is all about, the invitation remains open. The Unit meets every Tuesday evening at the Boat Shed in Sovereign Harbour. Turn up, pay attention, and be prepared to work. This is not a club for spectators. It is a place for people who want to become capable.

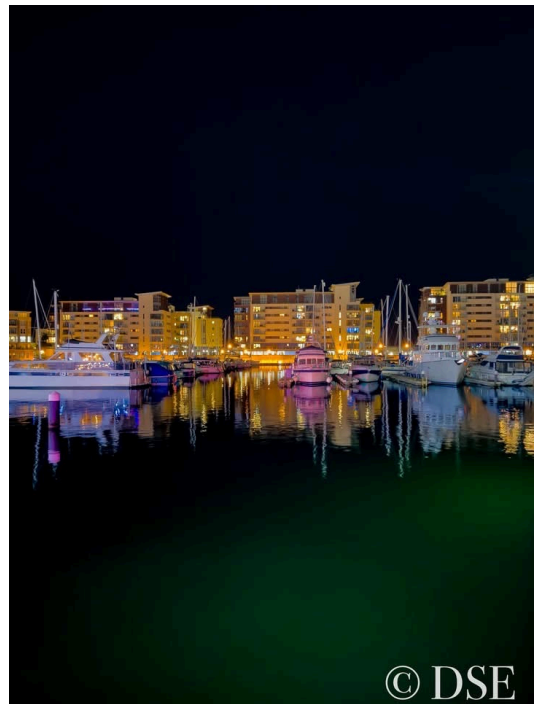

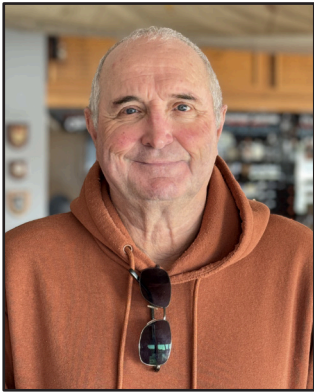
